Class News

Class 1 and 2

Last week we read Jack and the Beanstalk and we all planted a beanstalk of our very own! We hope the giant does not visit us again as we know how big his feet are because we measured the footsteps he left in our classroom! They were gigantic and much larger than ours!

We used lots of size comparison language whilst retelling and role playing the story. After we wrote a story map, we changed the story details, pinching the good ideas but making our own versions! We came up with some fantastic new settings we might find at the top of the beanstalk! We also used the beans to further our understanding of addition and subtraction.

We enjoyed beginning our sentences with "What if....?" to really develop our imaginations. One of us was so inspired, she even made her own castle and beanstalk at home! Wow!



We have concluded our Traditional Tales half term with our 'keeping safe' week and have used the traditional tales to set a context for safeguarding topics such as stranger danger, playing safely, keeping safe on-line and avoiding germs.

This week, as it was 'Internet Safety Awareness' week, we read stories like 'Chicken Clicking' where we could explore the choices the chick made around internet safety and how not to put ourselves in harm's way (I.e. The Big Bad Wolf!). The children then wrote some posters to help everyone remember the important rules.



We have discussed how to keep ourselves healthy by eating lots of fruit and vegetables (we have made some nutritious carrot soup) and washing our hands properly. We know that exercise keeps our bodies strong and we have agreed on making good choices so our classrooms remain places we feel happy and secure in. Our shared responsibility towards our well-being makes us all feel even more part of our RMS school family as we all try to 'do all the good we can'!

Class 3, 4 and 5

It has been a busy couple of weeks in key stage 1. During story-telling week, we learned a Traction Man sequel using actions. We then continued with the 'Pie Corbett' approach to writing by story mapping and then modifying the story with our own ideas. At the end of the week, we shared these stories with other children from around the school.



In maths, we have been exploring the concepts of multiplication and division. We have been learning to create equal groups and use sharing to help us to divide equally.



Within our topic, 'What is it made of and why?' we have been exploring the properties of objects and materials from around the classroom. Some children

have been grouping them according to their properties and we have been discussing why their properties make them suitable for a certain purpose.

We are incredibly proud of our year 1 and 2 gymnastics team who competed against 11 other schools from around the local area. The children had to learn and perform 3 complex routines and perform them to a panel of judges. Collectively, the team came 1st overall! with Millie-Rose also coming in first place within the whole age category.

Class 6, 7 and 8

Our children learned about storytelling last week in English. They started with a visual story called "The Catch" which was a short animated film. After story mapping it, we went out into the playground and acted out the tale. The children were inspired and excited, which was reflected in their high quality adventure writing! We also visited a different class on Friday afternoon to share and enjoy stories. It was a brilliant experience!



In our topic, we have started to learn about volcanoes. Some children in Classes 7 and 8 got around to making a 3D model.

There will be no paper homework or spellings over half term, however we would like all children to use Lexia, Sumdog and any other maths games to consolidate their times tables (such as typing in "Hit the Button" or "Maths Chase" into Google). BBC Bitesize is also a brilliant resource for maths and English games and activities. We would love you to continue to foster a love of reading and share a lovely experience with your child, such as exploring the library or visiting a bookshop.
